 of and sell to pay all my just Debts and all the Legacies
 after my Decease and of give and bequeath unto my Loving
 wife of mine one good Dwelling room and two good
 Cows and twelve bushels of grain yearly and every year
 viz three bushels of wheat and three bushels of rye and
 three bushels of corn and three bushels of buckwheat
 during her widow hood and two good hogs and a quarter
 of beef yearly for her own Living and if she want more
 she must it out of my Estate and if she should sick
 or lame or in want my Estate must relieve her in
 Distress and when ever it pleases god to take out of
 this world of order that she shall be buried in a Christian
 like manner out of my Estate. Likewise give and
 Bequeath Loving wife of mine and my Loving son
 Isaac all my moveable goods and household furniture
 whom of make Executors of this my Last will and Test
 ament of ten of give and bequeath unto my Loving
 gran Daughter Mary Daughter of my eldest son John
 if she lives with me or her gran mother till she be
 of age one good Cow with calf and a good Callas and
 papper of ten of give and bequeath unto my gran son
 John the eldest son of my son John the sum of five pound
 good money to be paid or paid in all former wills and Test
 aments by me made in witness whereof I have here
 set my hand and seal this twelfth Day of December
